• "No one has ever seen God; the only Son, who is in the bosom of the Father, he has made him known." John 1:18, NRSV
















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Holy Trinity

The Early Christian

"The Hand of God, an artistic metaphor, is found several times in the only ancient synagogue with a large surviving decorative scheme, the Dura Europos Synagogue of the mid-3rd century, and was probably adopted into Early Christian art from Jewish art. It was common in Late Antique art in both East and West, and remained the main way of depicting the actions or approval of God the Father in the West until about the end of the Romanesque period."


The Hand of God symbol, Ascension, Drogo Sacramentary

Icon, the Christian Art

"An icon is a religious work of art, most commonly a painting, from Eastern Christianity and certain Eastern Catholic churches...Eastern Orthodox tradition holds that the creation of Christian images dates back to the very early days of Christianity ... Modern academic art history considers that, while images may have existed earlier, the tradition can only be traced back to the 3rd century...The icons of later centuries can be linked, often closely, to images from the 5th century onwards, though very few of these survive from" the Byzantine **Iconoclasm**

The torture and martyrdom of the iconophile Bishop Euthymius of Sardeis by the iconoclast Byzantine Emperor Michael II in 824, in a 13th-century manuscript

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Byzantine Iconoclasm refers to the history of the Byzantine Empire when the use of religious images or icons was opposed by religious and imperial authorities within the Eastern Church and the temporal imperial hierarchy.

The Iconoclasm end in 843, The Western church remained firmly in support of the use of images throughout the period

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
Image Theme: Last Supper



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


Pop Culture: Arts Inspired By The Creation Of Adam

Popular Culture: Metaphor in Superman

"Superman's story goes something like this... From above, a heavenly father sends his only son to save the Earth. When he comes down to Earth, he'll be raised by two parents who originally had the names Mary and Joseph – now this is the Superman story we are talking about," Skelton says. When Superman comes of age, he travels to the arctic wilderness to commune with his father's spirit, which mirrors Christ's journey into the desert.




Popular Culture: Metaphor in Superman

"At age 30, Superman will embark on his public mission – this is the same age as Christ," he explains. "And then Superman will, in his mission as ministry, fight for truth and justice, two fundamental, biblical principles to base a mission on." He comes back to life after being killed in the last comic book published in 1992 called The Death of Superman. Then, Superman comes back to Earth – this is where the storyline in 2006's Superman Returns picks up. "Within the specifics of that story, I know of no other story that mirrors it so closely than the Christ story," Skelton says.
